



# More Than Conquerors

**“What shall we then say to these things? If God be for us, who can be against us? Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him that loved us” (Romans 8:31,37).**

“What shall we then say to these things? If God be for us, who can be against us? 32 He that spared not his own Son, but delivered him up for us all, how shall he not with him also freely give us all things? 33 Who shall lay any thing to the charge of God's elect? It is God that justifieth. 34 Who is he that condemneth? It is Christ that died, yea rather, that is risen again, who is even at the right hand of God, who also maketh intercession for us. 35 Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? 36 As it is written, For thy sake we are killed all the day long; we are accounted as sheep for the slaughter. 37 Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him that loved us. 38 For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, 39 Nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord” (Romans 8:31-39).

## Introduction

There are moments in life when people feel overwhelmed by pressure, disappointment, fear, sickness, uncertainty, or failure. Yet Romans 8:31–39 stands like a triumphant anthem of faith. The Apostle Paul does not speak with hesitation or doubt. He speaks with confidence, assurance, and joy. This passage reminds believers that God is for them, Christ intercedes for them, and nothing can separate them from the love of God. The Christian life is not the absence of battles; it is the presence of victory in the midst of them. We'll study this under these 6 headings:

- 1) If God Be for Us, No Opposition Can Ultimately Defeat Us
- 2) God Has Already Given His Greatest Gift
- 3) God Has Justified Us — Therefore Condemnation Cannot Rule Us
- 4) Nothing Can Separate Us from the Love of Christ
- 5) We Are More Than Conquerors Through Christ
- 6) God's Love Is Eternal and Unbreakable

## 1. If God Be for Us, No Opposition Can Ultimately Defeat Us

“What shall we then say to these things? If God be for us, who can be against us?” - Romans 8:31. Paul does not say that nobody will stand against us. He knew persecution, imprisonment, shipwreck, betrayal, and hardship. Yet he declares that no opposition can finally prevail against the purposes of God. Note the encouragement in these scriptures:

- “The Lord is on my side; I will not fear: what can man do unto me?” — Psalms 118:6
- “No weapon that is formed against thee shall prosper; and every tongue that shall rise against thee in judgment thou shalt condemn.” — Isaiah 54:17

Young David faced a giant warrior while others trembled in fear. David's confidence was not in his sling but in God. He told Goliath “Thou comest to me with a sword, and with a spear, and with a shield: but I come to thee in the name of the Lord of hosts.” —1 Samuel 17:45. The battle looked unequal, but God's presence changed everything.

During the Second World War, Winston Churchill continually encouraged Britain with words of resilience during the darkest days of bombing and uncertainty. Human courage can inspire nations, but the believer has something even greater — the assurance that Almighty God stands

with them. **When God is for His people, despair never has the final word.**

## 2. God Has Already Given His Greatest Gift

“He that spared not his own Son, but delivered him up for us all, how shall he not with him also freely give us all things?” — Romans 8:32. If God has already given Jesus Christ, the greatest gift imaginable, believers can trust Him for everything else they need. Note these scriptures:

- “Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father of lights.” — James 1:17
- “The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.” — Psalms 23:1

Never forget that, the cross is the everlasting proof of God’s love.

When Abraham was willing to offer Isaac, God provided a ram in the place of sacrifice. “And Abraham called the name of that place Jehovah-jireh: as it is said to this day, In the mount of the Lord it shall be seen.” — Genesis 22:14. This pointed forward to God giving His own Son for humanity. Sometimes people question whether God cares about them because prayers seem delayed or circumstances are difficult. Romans 8 reminds believers to look at Calvary. The cross settles the question forever.

## 3. God Has Justified Us — Therefore Condemnation Cannot Rule Us

“Who shall lay any thing to the charge of God’s elect? It is God that justifieth. Who is he that condemneth? It is Christ that died, yea rather, that is risen again, who is even at the right hand of God, who also maketh intercession for us.” — Romans 8:33-34

Many people live burdened by guilt, shame, regret, or memories of past failures. Yet in Christ there is forgiveness and restoration. Note these scriptures:

- “There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus.” — Romans 8:1
- “If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.” — 1 John 1:9

Peter denied Jesus three times, yet Christ restored him lovingly and powerfully. “Jesus saith unto him, Feed my sheep.” — John 21:17. **Peter’s failure was not the end of his story.**

Inventor Thomas Edison reportedly made thousands of unsuccessful attempts before perfecting the electric light bulb. Failure did not define him. Likewise, believers are not defined by past mistakes but by God’s grace. Christ not only died for believers — He now intercedes for them.


## 4. Nothing Can Separate Us from the Love of Christ

“Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword?” — Romans 8:35. Paul lists every imaginable hardship, yet declares none of them can sever believers from Christ’s love. Note these scriptures:

- “When thou passest through the waters, I will be with thee; and through the rivers, they shall not overflow thee.” — Isaiah 43:2
- “I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee.” — Hebrews 13:5

Daniel was thrown into the den because of his faithfulness, yet God remained with him. “My God hath sent his angel, and hath shut the lions’ mouths, that they have not hurt me.” - Daniel 6:22.

The danger was real, but God’s presence was greater. **Hardship does not mean abandonment. Storms do not cancel God’s promises. A Christian may walk through fire, but never alone.**



## 5. We Are More Than Conquerors Through Christ

“Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him that loved us.” — Romans 8:37. Paul does not merely say believers survive. He says they are “more than conquerors”. This means victory with abundance, triumph with testimony, and endurance with joy. Note these scriptures:

- “But thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.” — 1 Corinthians 15:57
- “Ye are of God, little children, and have overcome them: because greater is he that is in you, than he that is in the world.” — 1 John 4:4

Joseph endured betrayal, slavery, false accusation, and imprisonment. Yet God turned suffering into purpose. He told his brethren “But as for you, ye thought evil against me; but God meant it unto good.” — Genesis 50:20. Joseph did not merely escape hardship; he emerged stronger and became a blessing to nations.

Athletes often speak about the discipline behind victory. Gold medals are won long before competition day through perseverance, training, and resilience. Likewise, spiritual victory comes through trusting Christ through every season.

## 6. God’s Love Is Eternal and Unbreakable

“For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, Nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord.” — Romans 8:38–39. Paul ends with absolute certainty. God’s love transcends time, circumstance, spiritual powers, and even death itself. Note these scriptures:

- “The Lord hath appeared of old unto me, saying, Yea, I have loved thee with an everlasting love.” — Jeremiah 31:3
- “Jesus Christ the same yesterday, and to day, and for ever.” — Hebrews 13:8

The father of the prodigal welcomed his lost son home with compassion and joy, saying: “For this my son was dead, and is alive again; he was lost, and is found.” — Luke 15:24. This is the heart of God toward His children.

## Conclusion

Romans 8:31–39 is one of the greatest declarations of assurance in all Scripture. It teaches that:

- God is for His people.
- Christ has paid the price completely.
- Believers are forgiven and justified.
- Trials cannot separate them from God’s love.
- They are more than conquerors through Christ.
- God’s love is eternal and unchanging.

The Christian life is not founded upon fear but upon confidence in God’s unfailing love.

## Closing Exhortation

Whatever challenge may confront us today — uncertainty, illness, disappointment, grief, pressure, or fear — let us stand upon the promises of God.

Let faith rise higher than fear.

Let hope speak louder than despair.

And let every believer declare with confidence: “If God be for us, who can be against us?” — Romans 8:31. Amen.
